



Hope inspires marchers

In an attempt to make a difference, GACC students attend March for Life

For Guardian Angels Central Catholic senior Hannah McGill, the hope of making a difference is why she was one of thousands of marchers at the 45th annual March for Life January 19 in Washington, D.C.

That hope of one day seeing an end to abortion is what inspired McGill and 14 other students from Guardian Angels Central Catholic High School to march.

"As I'm getting older, and growing deeper in my faith, I just wanted to stand up and show others how wrong abortion is," McGill said. "The march was really cool. We got to be a part of something bigger than us."

The March for Life event is the annual Pro-Life rally, which commemorates Roe v. Wade. And much like in years past, people flooded D.C. to pledge their support.

Being a part of that was an amazing experience said GACC sophomore Noah Hass.

"The energy at the march was great. Everyone from our group had so much energy," Hass said. "We were singing and chanting. We lost our voices."

On top of being at the March for Life, going to the Planned Parenthood building was extremely impactful for GACC students.

"Being there, with all those people, you just realize how serious of a problem this is. We were there to address that problem," Hass added.

Sisters deliver Blue Ribbon speeches

Speakers at the 36th annual Blue Ribbon Supporters of Catholic Education Dinner April 9 at the Nielsen Community Center reinforced the value of Catholic school education.

Allyn Knobbe ('06) introduced sisters Jessica Cihacek Gill ('05) and Angela Cihacek Roeber ('98).

To 180 Catholic school supporters and the Bluejay camera they told their personal stories of life after high school where the spiritual relationship they had developed with Jesus in the Catholic school carried them through intensely difficult and challenging times.

As WOW Channel 6 Television weekend anchor and reporter, Jessica's personal plan for her life crashed when unplanned circumstances occurred that could jeopardize her lifetime goal. She was traumatized and overwhelmed. She shared her emotional trauma. Things went down hill. She realized she was not in control.

She found refuge in the teachings of the Catholic church where she acquired and continues "my relationship with my God."

"I think of my Catholic education as a journey of growing a relationship with God. It happens over time from kindergarten to 12th grade. Catholic education is the foundation," Jessica said.

She could pray 'If it is Your Will.' Jessica said, "As it turned out Jesus was with me in meeting the challenge. Accepting God's way made me a much better mother and a better journalist. My job as a television journalist covers a lot of very hard tragedies. I am not desensitized. I have compassion. God took me down this path."

"I am not the only one who struggles. Trust God to take care of you. Anytime you feel the need to grow, to be uncomfortable, God is there with you."

"I firmly believe. I am thankful," Jessica said.

Angela said, "Graduating from CC in 1998, I wanted to be my own person. As young adults we take our lives for granted. I had a plan of what I wanted to do with my life."

A UNL graduate in three years with marketing and journalism degrees, Angela married. The family has an 8-year-old daughter. They desired another child, but their personal plans and prayers were not working out as she told her heart-rendering story of miscarriages.

"My Catholic Faith is an important part of my life. God is the true healer when life is so out of control," she said.

But God had a plan.

At Angela's job as Director of Communications and Marketing at non-profit Omaha's Project Harmony, each day she sees 12 to 15 kids who are victims of child abuse.

"Child abuse is a very serious problem. It is growing. It is happening here in Cuming County," she said. "I am the voice of these children. I do my part to speak for them."

"I realize what I was given. I grew up with parents who encouraged me, gave me Faith and love, and this continued in Catholic school. This is a gift we take for granted. Not everyone is so blest."

"Life is too precious. My Faith has given me a future, and hope," she added. "I have hope."

We will also be doing a remodel of the high school office area and increasing the parking on the north side of the high school building.



With some of Guardian Angels Central Catholic's late-game misses, Ansley-Litchfield held on for a 49-43 win over the Bluejays in the opening round of the Class D1 girls state basketball tournament March 1 at Lincoln Southwest.

With the loss, GACC finished with a 20-7 record. This marked the final game for two seniors: Lexis Haase and Allie Knobbe. Haase was voted a Class D1 All-State player.

Knobbe was one of three Bluejays who didn't play at state due to injury.

"We had a great season. With all the adversity we had to overcome, I'm awfully proud of what these girls accomplished this season," Bluejay head coach Stracke said. "For them to make it to state was pretty remarkable."

This was GACC's 21st consecutive trip to state, which extends their own state record.

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Scholarships for alumni

The Louis and Abby Faye Dinklage Foundation of Wisner will make available a number of \$1000 scholarships for alumni of Guardian Angels Central Catholic High School who are full-time college students.

An application form is required for this scholarship even if you have received it in previous years. These scholarships may be applied to vocational training programs or a bachelor degree program where you are enrolled full time.

They are not applicable for a second bachelor degree or master degree programs. Also, if you have received four previous awards, you are no longer eligible.

Additionally, if you are a nontraditional student and working on your first degree, you may be eligible for an alumni scholarship. If you have just started post-secondary education and do not have a transcript yet, please provide current grades for the fall semester and proof enrollment for the Spring Semester or a copy of your Spring Semester Schedule.

Application forms are available at the high school counselor's offices or on the school websites.

The completed application form must be submitted to the school counselor's office on or before December 15th.

You must provide a transcript from your college/university and proof of enrollment for the Spring Semester or your Spring Semester Schedule. Scholarship funds will be distributed in January/February upon verification of successful completion of fall semester and enrollment of second semester.
