Open heart to the Lord

Leffler finds answer to 'what God wants of me,' is ordained into priesthood

Il it takes is one thought, one single question, to trigger change in a person's life.

For West Point native Taylor Leffler, it was one specific question, and an open heart to the Lord, that sent him down a lifechanging path.

That journey led Leffler to his calling in life.

On June 2, Leffler's life was forever changed as Archbishop George J. Lucas ordained him a priest at St. Cecilia Cathedral in Omaha.

And it was one question that triggered Taylor's call into the priesthood: "What does God want of me?"

Leffler had his life all figured out, or so he thought...

Taylor planned on attending the University of Nebraska-Omaha to study Aviation. He was going to become a pilot, and eventually work for Southwest Airlines.

Taylor was going to get married, start a family and have "beautiful, well-behaved" children. Leffler was going to travel the world. His plan all sounded so great.

"Even when he was little, his dream was always to fly planes," Taylor's dad, Dana Leffler said.

Leffler soon would find out that life is full of curveballs, and no one throws a better curveball than God.

After one year of college, Taylor knew his calling was elsewhere. And in a world that's all

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

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about 'me,' and 'what do I want,' Leffler's 'what does God want of me' question was rather out-ofthe-ordinary.

"I thought that I had to plan out my whole life so that I could be successful. And then I came across Jeremiah 29:11: 'For I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord,'" Leffler said. "That struck me for the first

"That struck me for the first time. I never really thought about God having a plan for my life. If God has a plan for my life, it'd probably be a good idea to ask him what that plan is."

From that moment, Leffler began to pray upon that and ask God to reveal His plan.

A vision of what God wanted from Taylor wasn't immediately revealed.

However, during his time of contemplation, through prayer and reflection, Leffler said different signs started to surface. One of the biggest signs appeared on a Sunday Mass during Vocations week.

All the questions about the priesthood would be answered in a 10-minute homily.

"One Sunday, I was singing in the high school choir. I remember Fr. Gerry Gonderinger got up and said, "Today is vocation awareness Sunday." My ears perked up," Leffler said. "He said, 'Instead of giving

"He said, 'Instead of giving a typical homily, I just want to talk about what my life is like as a priest, and what got me to the priesthood.' I didn't know at the moment I was being called to be a priest. But I knew God was really laboring for me to join the seminary."

Deep in his heart, Taylor knew God was starting to reveal the answer to his question: "What does God want of me?"

GACC pleased with STEAM Lab

Preparing students to reach their fullest potential is the primary mission for Guardian Angels Central Catholic. And the school will be taking a large step forward in fulfilling that goal.

GACC integrated a new STEAM SmartLab into the school's academic curriculum for the 2017-18 school year. STEAM Labs will be located in buildings of both Central Catholic and Guardian Angels.

Components of the STEAM Lab consist of placing an emphasis on science, technology, engineering, art and math. The reason behind launching a 'lab' like this is to enhance the ability of each student in areas such as critical thinking, problem solving, information

literacy and decision-making.

"This will open up some pathways to knowledge and careers for our students," GACC Principal Kate Hagemann said. "It's just a different way of thinking. It's hands-on and reaches a wide variety of learners."

In a statement released by GACC, the STEAM SmartLab provides learners with foundations in eight basic systems of technology known as "core competencies."

The basic systems are: Alternative and Renewable Energy;
Computer Graphics; Science and Data Acquisition; Mechanics and Structures; Multimedia Design / Computer Aided Publishing;
Robotics and Control Technology;

Circuitry; and Computer Simulation.

With this type of learning, GACC's administration is excited about the type of impact that will be made with utilizing this lab.

"This will provide our students with an extra opportunity to challenge themselves and extend what they can already do," GACC President Fr. Steve Emanuel said. "In any school system, you encounter limits, but hopefully for us, this will extend the ceiling for all of our kids.

"We want to expose them to all different types of learning. It's just another avenue to reach kids and take them to another level," Hagemann said.

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
