Wieneke finds his calling of making rosaries

rowing up, Gene Wieneke had two essential values instilled into his life: the importance of Mass and the power of praying the rosary.

Those values came from his parents, who were both strong Catholics.

"None of us did sports. We didn't have a TV or phone until the mid '60's," Wieneke said. "Our evenings were spent washing dishes, saying the rosary, then sitting outside as a family."

The rosary meant the world to Gene's dad (Vincent). So not only did he pray it, he made them as well.

"If you asked my dad for a rosary, he'd make you two. The rosary was very important to him," Wieneke added.

When Vincent's health began to slip, and he could no longer make rosaries, Gene knew someone had to take it over.

That someone turned out to be Gene, who has been making them for approximately the past 18 years.

At the time, Wieneke didn't realize how important making rosaries was, but over the years, he discovered just how deeply impactful it really was.


"I really enjoy it. I get more out of this than I would have ever imagined," Wieneke said.

A main highlight for Wieneke is making rosaries for the 2nd grade First Communicants, both for the Family Faith Formation students and Guardian Angels Central Catholic students.

To this day, Gene and his wife, Deanne, continue to donate rosaries to those students.

"Every kid making their First Communion needs to have a rosary," Wieneke said. "The neatest thing about it is all the thank you's from all the kids."

Another neat aspect for Wieneke is being a bus driver at GACC. Driving to

Trinity Heights the past couple years has been special for him.

"I get to know the kids a little more personally that way," Wieneke said.

Gene said it takes him about 90 minutes to make a rosary. The chain he uses is a shiny silver, and he loves when it changes color for a very specific reason.

"The neat thing is, the more you pray with that rosary, they turn to a gold color," Wieneke said. "So if it's gold, you know it's being used a lot."

Gene noted the strength of the rosary is well taught in West Point.

"The teachers here are incredible. The way they teach religion to the students; those kids are on top of things," Wieneke said. "By the

time they make their First Communion, they are very educated in the Catholic religion."

For Gene, that is what matters. "The rosary is just a tool that keeps track of your prayers. I just make that tool," Wieneke said. "The teachers who are teaching about the Catholic religion, that is

what's important."

Gene has also learned how to make rose petal rosaries, along with Marjorie Batenhorst.

Making rosaries for others is a tradition Wieneke is proud to carry on. Gene noted that his dad used to make rosaries for the Winnebago tribes and their CCD programs.

He also made rosaries to sell to anyone who wanted to buy one. Carol Schuetze sells them at Schuetze Plumbing in West Point. Every penny of those sales went directly to Relay for Life. And now, Gene does the same thing. Wieneke also fixes rosaries. And while he doesn't charge, any money that is given for a fixed rosary also goes directly to Relay for Life.

Wieneke wants to continue making rosaries for as long as he can. He also wants to start making them for the Knights of Columbus, and well as some extra ones for his grandkids.

During his time of making rosaries, Gene has encountered various experiences that have reinforced the importance of the rosary and knowing how powerful praying it really is.

"I never dreamt doing this would be so meaningful," Wieneke said. "Now I know why he [my dad] did it." Summer 2023 Edition Page 3

Kreikemeier, an 18-year-old senior at GACC, was killed in a farm accident on Thursday, May 11 just north of Snyder.

"Halle spread joy through our hallways with her huge smile. She laughed easily and often. One of her favorite school activities was game days and picking themes for ball games," GACC School Counselor Leslie Kreikemeier said.

"She gave others a sense of belonging by encouraging them to dress up and join in the student section. She was our Homecoming Queen because she was so kind."

GACC High School was open Thursday evening as counselors, GACC staff members and the ESU2 Crisis Team were available.

"ESU2 commented on how impressed they were with our students. In the midst of their mourning, they were composed and kind to one another," Leslie said. "It was so hard to see them so deeply sad, but it was also beautiful to see them hold each other, to go into the church together to pray."

With summer vacation arriving and school no longer being in session, Leslie's message to students



is "keep in touch."

"Students, send a text to a classmate that you may not text daily just to say hope you are having a good summer. Meet up and attend summer baseball games the way you go to fall football games. Go get shaved ice or ice cream. Spend time together," Leslie said.

"Parents, when you don't know what to say, just be present. Be in the same room. Give your child a hug on his or her way out the door. The human touch is incredibly healing."

Those who knew Halle will remember her genuine approach to

life. The love she shared with those around her didn't go unnoticed.

"Halle was kind and engaging to all she met, and made an effort to include everyone. She was creative and loved giving gifts or nice surprises. She was enthusiastic about school, her activities, and most importantly her faith," GACC teacher Matt Schlaebitz said.

"Her relationship with Jesus was genuine and deep. Halle was always smiling because she was able to focus on the good in life and never dwelled on the bad. Halle made me, and everyone in her life, feel truly loved and appreciated."
