GACC as a teacher/administrator/ staff?

A: "I moved back to West Point after college and there was a parttime math opening. I really wanted to teach where I had gone to school and to teach in a Catholic school." -Patty Meiergerd

A: "My daughters were attending GACC and I decided to volunteer at first when they were in school. I then got hired as a full time aide." -Carol McAuliffe

Q: What were your favorite classes or memories as a student at GACC?

A: "Some of the best memories were competing for the "Spirit Stick" at pep rallies and being in the pep squad. The pep squad wore matching uniforms and went to all the games to cheer on the Bluejays." -Cindy Stratman

Q: What is much different now at GACC than it was when you attended as a student?

A: "We attended Mass every morning. The majority of the staff were religious sisters and priests. The school had steam heat and no air conditioning. There were no girls sports until 1971." -Deanne Wieneke, secretary

A: "A lot has changed since I attended back in the 70s and 80s. We learned to keyboard on a typewriter. I was able to take a class on the computers which were first introduced in our school in 1985. There were no Smartboards, iPads, computers or phones in the classrooms." -Tina Gentrup, Elementary STEAM Facilitator / Technology Coordinator

Q: What was your graduation year?

Several answers: 2012, 1973, 2000, 1985, 2015, "A long time ago!"

Q: What do you hope your students take away from their experience at GACC?

A: "I hope they soak in all of the things that they have learned about our Catholic faith throughout their schooling, and that they find ample ways to share their faith with others well beyond the time they are students." -Erica Wimer

A: "I always tell them that they won't understand most of the ways that GACC is impacting their life until after they have left.

But I always hope that they leave here knowing that they were loved and cared about and that wherever life after GACC takes them they can always call this place home." -Kate Hagemann, GACC H.S. principal.


