

"We were blessed having Father Pat as our senior religion teacher and Father Pat was our Humphrey pastor. Fr. Pat checks in with us from time to time with "what's new? and how are the kids? and he never forgets to ask me like "How's your prayer life? Are you taking time to listen to Jesus in prayer?

"Questions like this are important. It makes me want to continue to grow and be comfortable. We are grateful for his spiritual direction and to other priests we've encountered through our marriage

of faith and service in the future.

"What I have found over the years since graduating from GCC was to determine my priorities and I'd have to check all this daily.

"When I'm honest with myself God wasn't always sitting at the top of my priorities. I have learned and decided over the years that God doesn't just sit at the top, God is in it all.

"It had to be God, plus my marriage. God, plus my family. God, plus my friends. God, plus my career. My foundation let me accept this invitation as an adult and want to work at it each day.

"I work full time as the speechlanguage pathologist in Columbus at an elementary school in serving K to 4 and I have a part time job at an outpatient pediatric clinic.

"I serve a diverse caseload serving students with complex communication needs, helping program communication devices so my students can have a voice just like any other kid. I also serve students with speech and language disorders, behavioral disorders, and a high number of students with Autism. I love it.

"I think the mission trips we took in high school helped prepare me to enter into a field of service specifically serving my students in special education.

I've always loved that saying from Saint Teresa of Avila.

Christ has no body but yours. No hands no feet on earth but yours.

Yours are the eyes with which He looks compassion on his world.

Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good.

Yours are the hands with which He blesses all the world.

Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are His body.

I've loved this saying because it reminds me what I strive to do in our day-to-day work and I have found that working in the schools it gives me something to fall back on and think about on the tough days because of course it's not always rainbows and butterflies working in education but it's the work God entrusted me to do and His plan for me.

"It's been fun to find ways to keep growing in my faith and spread that in my new home community in Humphrey we got the chance to make a Christians Encounter Christ weekend at the Norofolk Monastery. Our husbands went up one week and we followed a few weeks later.

"It helped to find a community that reminded me a lot of West Point to be able to continue my faith journey. We have struck with our prayer groups these last six years which has helped make me accountable and afloat in my faith journey. it's nice to be able to have a group of friends that are on the same path sending their kids to a Catholic school and trying to raise little Saints.

"I am forever thankful for a school system that pushed me to grow academically and spiritually and hey--- speech and softball were some of my favorite memories in there too."

"I am thankful for the wonderful community of people here in West Point that are devoted to continuing to raise our children students with a strong Catholic education.

Keep finding ways to push yourself and each other spiritually through prayer groups, through Christians encounter Christ weekends, through local retreats, regularly receiving the Sacraments and taking time to check in on your daily priority list in prayer.

Saint Anthony's Church at Saint Charles

The sunshine of a Saturday afternoon spotlighted the red brick St. Anthony's Church on the hill-side as it stood out against perfect blue sky with white clouds Saturday afternoon.

"For the beauty of the earth..."
From the steeple the bells rang across the Elkhorn River Valley one mile away, and to the west hills and green growing fields all around.

The parking lots encompassing the church were filled for the Saturday afternoon June 22 weekend Mass. Nearby an evergreen tree bordered fence line marked the cemetery with 1867 inscribed on the iron gate.

It was an intensely emotional day.

The church was filled with people for the half hour music prelude before Mass was to begin at 4:30. The choir began singing a continuous medley of carefully selected hymns expressing their thoughts, emotions and prayers of praise and love to God.

The stained glass lower open windows added to the beauty as they let in the summer warmth breezes and music flowed in the bright uplifting church interior.

The renowned choir was singing their hearts out going through the traditional sacred hymns of the past 157 years.

"Surely goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life"

"Gentle Woman, teach us wisdom":

"We are a Pilgrim people, we are the Church of God. . . . "

This parish, St. Anthony's at St. Charles Township was the first established in Northeast Nebraska. It was organized by Germanspeaking immigrant pioneers from Saint Anthony's parish in Europe.

"One spirit one church . . . a family of believers. . . united ln one spirit. . .still burning through the ages, still present in our lives."

Give thanks to the Lord for His love is everlasting. . . "

The 90-year-old lifetime organist led the signature St. Anthony's Choir through several generations of passionate singers. Today the six member choir,---the organist' son, daughter, two granddaughters and two brothers who are her cousins, continue the legacy of unique sacred hymns that sang in their lives.

Mass goers were quietly following the words to the music with their memories and hearts. Even babies and toddlers were quietly enraptured.

As 4:30 Mass time came around parish spokesperson David Ortmeier took the microphone to announce what everyone already knew, "This is the last weekend Mass to be held in St. Anthony's."

Ortmeier told of the parish's beginnings when in the late 1850's and beginning 1860's immigrant German-speaking Catholics from St. Anthony of Padua parish in Europe settled here. Immigrant pioneers waited three months for a horseback riding priest to say Mass for

In 1867 the group built a log church. This was the first Catholic church north of the Platte River in Northeast Nebraska. In 1873 a frame church was built but in 1905 the present red brick building now occupied was built and dedicated with weekend Masses ever since.

The mural above the altar depicts the Immaculate Conception which was pronounced during

this era. The stained glass windows hold long-time donor family names. The statue of St. Anthony holding the Christ Child is on a side altar.

Ortmeier expressed thanks to all parishioners in these past 157 years who shared their talents and labor and life for this parish.

"Today seven generations have called this their parish home and we are gathered here today for a final weekend Mass, "Ortmeier said.

Music continued.

"Give thanks to the Lord, for His Love is Everlasting"

Father James Weeder then began the celebration of the Mass.

"Glory to God in the highest..."
"O Santissima"

In keeping with this Sunday's gospel Father Weeder said, "It doesn't end. It continues. Jesus said 'Let us cross to the other side.' Jesus is the same, yesterday, today, and forever. "

It was the same message to the pioneers when they had NOTHING except their Faith." Mass continued.

"Blest are they. . .

"For the beauty of the earth, ... "Let there be peace on earth..."

The great "Amen."

Congregational singing the special patron saint song of thanks-giving: "St. Anthony, we turn to thee...."

The glorious final blessing. . . The prayer,

"O Good St. Anthony, messenger of mercy, bring the consolation of Divine Mercy into our lives, help us to share the message with others, so that the whole world will come to know that God is good."

"Holy God We praise thy name Everlasting is thy reign."
